

## Caring for 70 years

1952-2022

Celebrating the history of HorseWorld


It is hard for us to imagine or remember now, but just over a hundred years ago horses were a part of everyday life on our streets, farms and canals. No one then could have thought of a life without them. Working horses were strong and reliable, they were part of the country's industry and were essential to distribution of goods, transport and farming.

It is equally hard to remember the sound of a town, such as Bristol, before the background roar of the motor car – to a time when the sound of horses hooves clattering along the street, and time was tolled out by the great bells of the church.

After the First World War the use of horses began to decline. Ironically, The Second World War extended the use of working horses as several million were used in battle and to supply the lines of troops on the Western Front.

However, by 1950 the end was in sight. In Bristol, horses were





still being used by the Western Region of the newly nationalized British Rail, by the Bristol Corporation. On the other hand, local coal merchants, milkmen, and greengrocers still used horses on their delivery rounds and their horses were recognized and loved by their customers.

In Bristol, the railways were the single biggest users of horses, and the GWR had an extensive distribution network for the passengers and freight it carried. At its peak in 1913 the railway had 30,000 horses in Great Britain, but by 1945 this number had fallen to 9,000. Several years later, the railway announced that they were going to convert entirely to motorised transport and close all the stables.

HorseWorld's founder, Mabel Cocksedge was a young woman who worked for the railway at Bristol Temple Meads. She would have spoken to the carters each day and she shared their concerns about what would happen to the horses when the stables closed. It was likely that many would be sold for horse meat. It was amidst this setting that The Friends of Bristol Horses Society was born, later to become HorseWorld.

Mabel and her like-minded friends, Alderman Knight and Reverend Ian Murdoch were appalled at the fate that beheld these faithful old servants and so they founded the Friends of Bristol Horses Society. They successfully campaigned to raise awareness and funds to rescue working horses from slaughter and give them a long, happy retirement and steadily the charity grew.

A year later, two very important ladies joined the charity after seeing a picture of a horse the Society had rescued in a local paper. Their names were Marjorie Pelling and Madge Checkley, and between them they ran the charity for 45 years.

In 1960, the Reverend lan Murdoch, one of the society's founders sold his half of Staunton Manor Farm to the Society. He was moving to Canada and offered to sell his share of the farm to the Society for the sum of £2,500 – which was significantly less than its market value. At that time, the other half of the farm was owned by a garden tools company.

This represented a huge step forward for us, as previously horses had been homed on odd pieces of land owned by members and supporters.

In just three months, this derelict property was fit and ready to receive horses, and

Marjorie and Madge moved into the farmhouse. In 1960 the farm was officially opened by Lady Cadbury.

However, in the late 60's the 11 acres at Staunton Manor was getting too small and the society had the chance to buy the farm next door, Keynes Farm where the charity is based to this day.

In 2000, Staunton Manor Farm opened as HorseWorld Visitor Centre. It remained open for 14 years but sadly, the running costs and ever-increasing cost of maintaining the Grade 2 listed buildings became a drain on the charity's resources so the Visitor Centre sadly closed in 2014. Visitors can now visit Keynes Farm next door on set Open Days which appear on the events page of the website.

#### So what does HorseWorld do now?

Although there are fewer working horses today, the need for our services has never been greater. Record numbers of horses are being abandoned on waste ground, cruelly treated or neglected. We work with organizations such as the RSPCA, and the police to rescue these poor animals who would otherwise face a bleak future.

Whereas in the early years of the charity, the horses were mainly older animals, ready for retirement. Nowadays, they can be any age and some are even born at HorseWorld if we rescue pregnant mares. This meant that sanctuary space was running out so in the year 2000 we started rehoming horses on a loan scheme.

Thanks to this approach we are able to care for many more horses than ever before. Rescued horses go through a tailored rehabilitation and training process to prepare them for their lives ahead to give each horse the time it needs to regain health and confidence before it goes on to start a new life.

This may be in a loan home or they may become one of the Discovery Team members. Our Discovery Courses boost the confidence, emotional well-being and life-chances of disadvantaged and vulnerable young people through an innovative learning programme that brings them together with our gentle rescued horses.

# Inspiring story Ginny and Thor

Thanks to you, horses like Thor and Ginny have survived despite challenging circumstances.



You may remember last year, we were called to help rescue three very neglected and heavily pregnant Thoroughbred mares. The case was the subject of an ongoing prosecution at the time meaning we weren't able to talk publicly about their story. We told you about Thor and Ginny our two miracle foals.

Thor who was born prematurely weeks after the rescue then just a few weeks later, we welcomed a filly foal to HorseWorld whom we named Pink Gin – or Ginny for short.

You, our supporters responded to our Valentine's appeal and we raised over £2,300 to help with the care toward this family.

Since then, this family has continued to improve. Ginny and Thor are now weaned from their mothers and are enjoying some springtime fun with new friends. Ginny still has on going health issues and after receiving a small injury in the field went on to develop an infection, a reminder to us that she is a little more sensitive and continues to need our expert care. Thor is a great big brother and is strong and healthy, but Ginny is certainly the braver of the two and when it came to weaning time she was a huge support to him.

The situation when we rescued the mares was dire – we didn't know if any of them would survive. Thanks to the expert care from the

HorseWorld team and our vets the future for Thor and Ginny and their mums is bright, they have a home for life with us at HorseWorld. They will continue to need on-going care. Long periods of neglect have an impact on their health and this means they will need veterinary treatment for a long time.

Supporters like you make a real difference for horses, mules and donkeys in the UK – we couldn't keep saving horses in need of help without you. Thank you so much for making this possible.

Ginny and Thor will never know the cruelty and neglect their mothers suffered as HorseWorld will always ensure their every need is met.

## Discovery



As with most horse owners, the whole team at Discovery are glad to finally see the end of winter, with the sun making an appearance and the mud drying up! Looking out across the fields to see our horses enjoying turnout without their rugs on really does put a smile on our faces!

We have seen a few changes within our herd since the last newsletter including the well-earned retirement of a few of our older members. As these horses go off to enjoy their retirement, we welcomed 2 new horses; Archie and Monkey. Archie was rescued by HorseWorld in 2013, severely underweight and with bad rain scald across his back. He recovered well and was backed before going out on a loan home as a ridden horse. Archie

returned to HorseWorld in 2021 to begin his training to become a Discovery horse. He has thrived in his new role and is a hit with all students. His gentle and kind personality really shines through and, although he is big and brave, he can sometimes be quite nervous. This helps our students to realise it is okay to feel worried or anxious and need a helping hand, and they always rise to the occasion to give Archie the calm, confident lead he needs.


Waffle has now been with us for one year and has progressed really well in his new job, despite suffering with foot abscesses which required some time off.

We very sadly said goodbye to our dear Shetland pony. Jake in January. After becoming suddenly unwell, he was diagnosed with liver failure. We were all heartbroken to lose him.

As well as changes to our equine team, we have also seen some changes to the human team! We have welcomed Alice. who is currently working as a Groom along with Kayleigh who has taken on the role of Discovery Yard Supervisor. Both have fitted in well to the team and are already making a huge difference to the lives of our horses and young people.

The demand for Discovery courses remains high following the impact of Covid on our young people. With an average of 56 students per term so far for this academic year, our team (both humans and horses!) are working hard to help improve the lives of the young people coming to us. And, in turn, the young people are helping us to change the lives of our beloved rescue horses!





HorseWorld have many horses and ponies hoping for a second chance at finding their loving, forever home that they have always desired.

Sadly, most of the horses that arrive into our care have never known what it means to be loved and cared for correctly, but we are here to help provide that for them and need your help to continue doing so.

By choosing to rehome a rescued horse from us, not only are you giving them a second chance at life, but are also helping to create crucial space at our farm, allowing us to rescue more horses in need of our help.

We have a variety of horses and ponies available for rehoming, from Shetlands, to Thoroughbreds, and everything in between! All of the horses currently available for rehoming are advertised on our website - horseworld.org. uk/rehoming. We sometimes have a few more horses in the process of being advertised but not yet on the website, so it is always worth getting in touch with our rehoming team and beginning the conversation.

We currently have around 190 horses on loan, and would love to continue to find more of our horses their perfect, forever home.

We have a rehoming radius of 1½ hours / 90 minutes drive from our yard based in South Bristol. We will consider homes slightly outside of this radius if we have other loaners nearby. If you are at all unsure as to whether you fall within this radius, please email your postcode to our rehoming team and they will be happy to let you know.

We always try to match up our rehoming horses as closely as possible with the equines they would be going to live with so that they can enjoy the company of their friends at all times and not have to be kept separately. We take pride in not only finding the right homes for our horses, but also finding the right match for our loaners.

## From the yard...



#### In our last newsletter, you might remember Twiglet's story, here is an update on his progress.

Twiglet had suffered sickening cruelty and neglect when he was discovered straying in a Bristol industrial estate in the middle of the night in 2015. The young colt was painfully thin and had suffered horrific injuries to his back and neck which had resulted in fractures to his spine in several places.

Despite his terrible start in life, Twiglet made a remarkable recovery and went on to become a fully trained Equine Assisted Learning pony with our Discovery Courses, working with children who are outside mainstream schooling or struggling to learn in a classroom environment.

As soon as Twiglet joined the Discovery team he made such a positive impact.
Despite the horrific cruelty he had experienced before HorseWorld rescued him he is such a gentle and patient boy and loved being around our students. He absolutely thrived from all the attention!

However, as we worked more with him we quickly noticed that he was physically struggling. The injuries he suffered in his past have had long-term effects on his body and he was showing us he just wasn't comfortable, even though he was trying so hard.

The wellbeing of our amazing horses is always our priority, so Twiglet is now going to be available for rehoming as a companion so that he can be part of a loving family and receive the one-to-one attention he deserves.

Whilst we're so sad to see this very special boy leave the Discovery team, we know this is absolutely the best decision for him. He has got so much love to give and we can't wait to see him settled in a loving home.

## Jasper came to HorseWorld as a 2-year-old in 2020 as part of an RSPCA rescue.

They had all been badly neglected and unfortunately, the two other horses that Jasper came in with, Havana and Sydney, didn't make a full recovery and were sadly put to sleep later that year. You may remember reading about Sydney in our Autumn 2020 newsletter.

Though it was clear when Jasper arrived he had received very little human contact, his general condition was much better than the other two and he showed promising signs he would develop into a wonderful little pony. The first port of call was to gain Jasper's trust so that he would be comfortable being handled. He needed to be castrated before he could join the main herd but as he's such a friendly pony, it didn't take long to settle in and find his place in the group.

Over the next year or so Jasper continued with his handling training and came on in leaps and bounds. Unfortunately, in late 2021, Jasper started suffering with locking stifles. The stifle is the ioint that bends backwards at the top of the hind leg, the equivalent of our knee joint. Locking stifles are most commonly seen in youngsters and those who may not have received the correct nutrition at an early age can be more susceptible. He was examined by the vet, who felt he had

a good chance of recovery with the right support and rehabilitation plan to help strengthen and develop the muscles that support his back end. Madie Cole, Rehabilitation Groom, implemented a meticulous and thorough exercise plan for Jasper over the next couple of months under the vet's guidance, in the hope that Jaspers condition would improve.

Within a few weeks Jasper was confidently going for walks and being long-reined (walking behind the horse holding long reins) in the arena and out around the farm. Madie built up his workload carefully and gradually. Jasper has made fantastic progress and is now a lot stronger and more fluid in his movement. As Jasper is relatively young, we have been

really careful with how much work he has done. Enough to strengthen his stifles, but not enough to compromise his development or sour his attitude to work.

Jasper had his last veterinary check-up in February 2022 and the vet was very pleased with his progress. We hope to keep moving forwards with Jasper's training and hope eventually he will thrive as a little riding pony. He has such a lovely temperament and really eniovs his work so it would be fantastic if he could go on to give children as much pleasure as he has given us. We are currently unsure as to where his future lies, either as a muchloved member of the Discovery Team or being rehomed to a loving family - either way we know that he has a lot of love and fun to give!



## Volunteers welcomed for coffee morning

The sun was shining and the skies were blue when we welcomed some of our marvellous volunteers to a volunteer coffee morning.

As well as enjoying homemade cake and hot drinks, it was a great opportunity to update our existing volunteers on all our news and welcome several new volunteers to HorseWorld.

We were treated to a fabulous clicker training demonstration – HorseWorld Groom, Alice and Patty the Donkey were working in our new round pen whilst Welfare Officer, Vicky told us all about the training and how important it is to keep our animals brains healthy as well as their bodies.

Equine Critical Care Supervisor, Joanne then took us on a mini-tour of the site where she introduced lots of our residents, including Thor and Ginny, our rescue foals who were born on site last year and, of course, no tour would be complete without a visit to Frank the Hinny!








#### **YOUR HORSE LIVE**
