Welcome



We all love the springtime at HorseWorld, after a long, particularly wet winter, there is something very refreshing about seeing the daffodils in flower and blossom on the trees. It is hard to believe this is the third spring I've enjoyed at HorseWorld, time always flies by when you are busy.

This year, we were relieved when the grass started to grow, as we are at capacity with the number of horses and donkeys at our Farm. However just as this newsletter was about to go to print, we were asked to take part in a multi-agency rescue and were happy to help. We will never turn down a horse in need, so when our rescue lorry returned with 5 neglected ponies on board, the team spun into action to implement our isolation procedures over the next few weeks, to prevent any spreading of disease until they are cleared fit to integrate with our herd. I hope once the legal formalities are over, we can tell you more in our next newsletter.

Of course, growing grass is also a challenge for some of our horses who suffer from laminitis, or a tendency to become overweight. We are in the process of setting up 3 new track grazing systems and will monitor the benefits this has on their welfare over the summer. We will keep you updated on this in a future newsletter.

For now, I hope you enjoy reading the stories about our rescued horses, it is great to see Blossom and Forest doing so well, but we were devastated when Thor became sick, despite all the best veterinary support and round the clock care from the team, he lost his fight for life. Our spirits have been lifted with the story of Police horse Clover, and Berry, rehomed back to a special place.

Working at HorseWorld is always a journey of highs and lows, seeing the results of our Discovery programme with young people is inspiring term after term, and you'll see we have included some of the 2022 statistics. Looking forward we are thrilled to be launching a new Ofqual Diploma for providers of Equine Assisted Services, working together with other organisations to improve skills across the sector. I am pleased to report we have more highs than lows, and there are more exciting plans underway.

We're over the moon to tell you both are now doing really well! Thanks to your support, we were able to give them all the specialist care they needed and they have gone from strength to strength.

Forest had to wear special
glue-on shoes for a while
to help straighten his legs.
The extreme malnutrition
his mother had suffered
whilst pregnant and the poor
start he had in life meant

his development had been compromised. The procedure was successful and he's now moving like a normal youngster and tearing around like a racehorse!

Forest didn't learn the social skills he needed at an early age as he and his mother were both so fragile they had to be isolated from the other horses. Now they're strong enough, the pair are out in a field with other youngsters. Here Forest can play and learn the herd behaviour he needs to integrate. Older mares in the group also help to teach him by pushing him away from the herd when he oversteps the mark and allowing him back in when he behaves respectfully These are all important skills for a young horse to learn and

would be an integral part of his development if living in a wild herd.

We're optimistic that both Blossom and Forest have a bright future ahead of them now. Thank you for being a part of their life-changing transformation!

Heartbreak at HorseWorld

You may remember Ginny and Thor, two foals born at HorseWorld after we rescued their

heavily pregnant mothers in 2021.



After more than a year battling various health problems, we have the extremely sad news that Thor has sadly passed away.

The neglect his mother suffered whilst pregnant had set his tiny body up for a battle he couldn't win. We fought with no expense spared in his veterinary care but he suddenly took a turn for the worse. Blood tests revealed his digestive system was failing fast and we were left with no choice but to put him to sleep.

In 2021, Ginny and Thor's heavily pregnant mothers were found in horrific condition with a third mare who sadly didn't survive. They were desperately malnourished with over-grown hooves, living in a filthy barn, covered in lice and with nasty skin infections.

Back at HorseWorld, Thor was born prematurely. The team battled around the clock to save him. His mother, named Lisa Jane (or LJ for short), also



came down with an infection soon after giving birth. The strain on her compromised immune system meant it kept returning and sadly, poor U didn't recover.

Ginny

The other mare named Pink Champagne gave birth to a healthy foal. We breathed a sigh of relief and named the foal Pink Gin or Ginny for short.

Whilst Ginny appeared healthy, the neglect her mother was subjected to while pregnant had also left her with a weak immune system and she soon fell ill. Once again, the team sprang into action to work 24/7 to keep her alive.

Now feeling much better, Ginny's health has been a rollercoaster. Without your support we couldn't continue this intensive care and we are so grateful for every donation giving Ginny the best possible chance of a good life.

Bert

Bert arrived at HorseWorld along with a pony named Ernie in 2013. They had been rescued by the RSPCA after being abandoned in South Wales and were in a shocking condition. Both ponies had very overgrown hooves which were badly infected and riddled with maggots.

HorseWorld grooms clipped the hair from their legs so the vet could treat the infection. This revealed how overgrown their hooves were. They had risen upwards so both ponies looked like they were walking on platform heels. Their hooves needed a lot of care and attention to gradually bring them back to a normal, healthy, comfortable shape.

Bert and Ernie went on to be rehomed separately on our rehoming scheme but due to a change in circumstances, Bert later returned to HorseWorld.

Our grooms noticed he had the potential to make a great Discovery pony so Bert is now in the final stages of his training to become part of the Discovery Team. It's a truly magical thing to see a

rescued horse complete their rehabilitation and go on to thrive, find a purpose in life and make a huge difference to the lives of disadvantaged and vulnerable young people.

It takes a lot of time, patience and dedication to nurse a horse like Bert back to full health and then put in the many hours of training needed to ensure they become the educated, well-rounded individual they are capable of being. To see a horse who has previously been cast aside and regarded as worthless go on to realise their true value in life and become such an incredibly

Police horse, Clover meets Lolly the Shire horse



Seven-year-old PH Clover had served with South Wales Police since 2021 and had all the attributes to have a fantastic career. However, when Clover was diagnosed with Wobblers Syndrome (which means the signals from his brain to his limbs aren't fully coordinated), he was no longer able to cope with the physical demands of being a police horse. That's when HorseWorld came to the rescue.

The gentle giant is in good company at HorseWorld alongside Shire horse, Lolly who was rescued in 2017. Lolly also has neurological problems very similar to Clover's so will continue to live at HorseWorld for the rest of her life where her condition can be managed. Both Lolly and Clover will have their individual needs met and we can guarantee they'll have the best possible care for the rest of their lives.

Lolly was rescued along with two other horses named Dime and Florin. They were



part of a herd of 27 Shire horses abandoned by their breeder. Multiple equine rescue organisations were involved in the rescue, each taking as many horses as they had room for.

Dime went on to be trained to harness and has found a fantastic loan home as a traditional working Shire horse. The elderly Florin lived to a good age but has sadly now passed away. Lolly remains at HorseWorld and is the latest addition our Sponsorship Scheme.

Do you remember in our Autumn/Winter 2021 Newsletter we told you about Buttons and BamBam?



The two foals were born at HorseWorld in the spring of 2021 after their pregnant mothers were rescued the autumn before. Growing up together, causing mischief left, right and centre, the pair developed an unbreakable bond.

When they were old enough to start looking for a home on our loan scheme we decided it would be best if they could stay together. It was then that Tracey Small saw the duo on our website and decided she would like to rehome them.

At the time, Tracey was working as a Police Officer in the Avon and Somerset mounted unit. She had already met Buttons and BamBam when she came to HorseWorld to complete some training with her partner, Police Horse Mike a few weeks before.

Tracey welcomed the pair home and renamed them after equine heroes from her favourite films: Pie from International Velvet and Pilgrim from The Horse Whisperer. Tracey says the pair are as cheeky as ever and have such a strong bond they share a stable. She told us Pie is the bravest (which doesn't surprise us at all), whereas Pilgrim takes a little extra time to adjust to new things but is becoming braver by the day. They are very friendly and will follow Tracey around 'helping' with the poo picking and mucking out. It's so wonderful to see our HorseWorld rescues doing so well in their new homes.

Today, Tracey works as part of our Discovery Programme at HorseWorld as Discovery Yard Supervisor. We are incredibly lucky to have her working with us and are always asking her for updates about Pilgrim and Pie.

In July 2020, we received a rather surreal call to say a pony was being kept in the area surrounding a swimming pool, using the changing rooms as shelter. It's not the sort of call you receive every day and we just had to find out what was going on.

On arrival at the property along with the RSPCA and a Council Animal Welfare Officer, was desperately searching we were stunned to find a small, grey mare dangerously walking around the edge of the unfenced pool. The family had bought her with good intentions but had no knowledge of how to look after a pony. It was agreed the best thing for everyone would be to sign the mare over into HorseWorld's care.

Back at HorseWorld, Berry received the usual health checks, vaccinations, farriery, dentistry and general care which is standard for all HorseWorld equines. Over the next couple of years, she went from strength to strength, taking part in training so that she would be ready to look for a home on our loan scheme.


Meanwhile, little did we know. Charlotte from North Somerset for Berry. She had owned her as a foal and a change in her circumstances had forced her to rehome her. She had since discovered to her horror, the person she had trusted to have Berry had sold her and had lost all trace of her.

Charlotte was overjoyed to discover Berry was on our website after she had posted on her Facebook page that she was looking for Berry along with photographs of her. Kim, the Animal Health and Welfare Officer for BANES Council, who had accompanied HorseWorld on the rescue, saw Charlotte's post and told Charlotte that she thought Berry was at HorseWorld looking for a loan home.

Charlotte cried for 2 days when she realised she had found her! She got in touch and left multiple messages for the team to ensure Berry didn't go anywhere! After making the application, coming to HorseWorld to meet her and having a home check completed, Berry was on her way back home.

"She's settled in like she's never been away" said Charlotte "It's great to have her home." Berry and Charlotte will have the support of HorseWorld's rehoming team for the duration of the loan. Charlotte is hoping that Berry will eventually become her daughters pony and the two of them will do some showing together.

Horses for Health (H4H) aims to celebrate how horses can help with your mental health and well-being whilst raising money for equine charities across the UK.

In November 2020, we rescued 5 cobs who were part of a much larger group, seized by the RSPCA after being horribly neglected. Amongst them was Aura.

Aura was estimated to be around 2 years old and she didn't have a lot of trust in people. She was reluctant to be caught and any sort of contact with a human was very stressful for her - even a gentle scratch on her withers or a soft stroke on her nose.

The team allowed her time to be a youngster and get used to her new surroundings and herd, before creating a gentle rehabilitation plan to increase her handling experience and help her be more confident around people. We knew this would be a slow process, but it was important not to rush Aura's learning and make sure she remained comfortable throughout. After a few weeks her confidence grew and her loving personality began to shine through.

Now, two years later, she has been successfully trained as a ridden horse and has recently found a foster home. As long as she keeps enjoying her training, after a couple of years she will return to HorseWorld and become part of the Discovery team. There she will be assisting students with their learning and encouraging them to find their self belief and be more confident, just like she did on her own iourney of recovery. All of us at HorseWorld are truly blown away by her progress and are so excited to see her journey continue. She truly is a HorseWorld Hero.

The mission of the Thrive approach is to help children and young people become more emotionally resilient and better placed to engage with life and learning and Discovery is proud to be a part of this. The training included basic training for the whole team with more in-depth training for facilitators. We are also pleased to announce that Karen and Deb, two of our senior facilitators, are now Thrive Licensed Practitioners.

Our Discovery horses enjoyed a short break over the Christmas period and were happy to come back into work with the students again. Cleo and Jubilee have been taking an extended holiday with our Welfare team. (The horses' welfare is always our priority, so we constantly monitor their behaviour to ensure we notice signs they might need a break and ensure they get the time away they need.)

They will both be re-assessed after their break to check whether they are ready to continue and to enjoy their work.

In March, we were delighted to be part of the celebrations at Saddlers Hall in London alongside fellow Horses in Education and Therapy International (HETI) members. The event was to mark one year since the creation of Human Equine Interaction Register UK; an essential resource which is bringing together all people involved in the field of human equine interactions to ensure high quality service provision and create a greater awareness of our work.

Petra Ingram, HorseWorld's CEO, gave a presentation sharing some of the stories about our

amazing students for whom Discovery has been a lifeline. The presentation was attended by HRH The Princess Royal! Meeting and connecting with so many passionate individuals and organisations, all of whom share our vision of a world where horses and people help each other to live and work in harmony, was a fantastic opportunity.



We are thrilled to be part of equine charities collaborating to launch a new National Qualification: Level 3 Diploma in Equine Assisted Services

HorseWorld Trust, TheHorseCourse, Sirona Therapeutic Horsemanship and Equilore, who are all members of The Human Equine Interaction Register (HEIR), have collaborated to develop an Ofqual regulated Level 3 Diploma in unmounted equine assisted service (EAS).

The Diploma, a Level 3 Award, is an open access qualification aimed at individuals who are already working or intending to work as facilitators or coaches in the specialised field of equine assisted services (EAS). The Diploma course, which can be accessed through OCN London, aims to ensure all facilitators of equine assisted services have the required level of horsemanship and other skills to carry out the

role safely and effectively in the unmounted area of this expanding sector.

HorseWorld are extremely proud to become a Training Centre offering places to people wanting to study for this qualification working alongside our HorseWorld Discovery Programme team.

The Diploma is the equivalent to an entry level equine teaching qualification or a BHS Stage 3 Coach and offers a comprehensive EAS qualification which will set up facilitators working in unmounted EAS practice with a safe, ethical and effective practice.

Once our own facilitators have completed the Diploma, we look forward to making it available to others across the sector.

HorseWorld's Discovery Courses change lives in so many ways. This is an account from the parent of a student who wanted to let us know what it's meant to her.



Discovery at HorseWorld has been amazing for my daughter aged 11 with a diagnosis of autism, who struggles with anxiety and has complex needs.

Unfortunately, there was no school place going into year 7 for my daughter and she felt incredibly low after not fitting in at her previous mainstream school. Alternative Provision was organised via Bristol Local Authority to enable my daughter to access some kind of learning and social interaction in the interim. Luckily for us Discovery was part of that provision.

We didn't know what to expect on our first visit and my daughter was incredibly anxious. The 1-to-1 assigned to my daughter very quickly worked out how to manage her needs and got her chatting and joining in her first session. Every session thereafter became a more positive experience for her.

Over the weeks, my daughter's confidence has grown; it has helped her have a more positive outlook on things. The sessions help her relax, have fun, build confidence and help her feel part of something. The support from the staff also stretches to attending meetings regarding EHCP's etc and liaising with school/Local Authority.

My daughter has now been allocated a school place but because of having been out of school for so long and finding her previous mainstream school difficult, the transition will take some time. Luckily Discovery are going to help with the transition and I know their support will be hugely beneficial.

We have had years of trying to find places where my daughter feels safe, happy and understood. I can honestly say this is the only place that has worked up until now. The combination of the beautiful horses, the outdoors, and of course the wonderfully understanding staff makes this the perfect haven for children like my daughter.

To see my daughter smiling and enjoying herself is priceless!

Gentle giant, Lolly is an enormous Shire horse with an even

Lolly is the biggest resident at HorseWorld, she stands at around 18.3hh and is too tall for the measuring stick!

She arrived in 2017 as part of a large multi-charity rescue involving 27 shire horses. We were hopeful that Lolly would eventually find her forever home with a loving family. However, one day the grooms saw Lolly fall in her field and knew something was wrong. The vet was called and after some tests she was diagnosed with a neurological condition. This means Lolly will spend the rest of her days here at HorseWorld as this gentle giant can become wobbly and unsteady on her feet. But here we can manage her condition, and our staff know how to keep themselves safe, whilst she has all the love and attention she needs!

Apollo

This stunning boy came to HorseWorld in 2019 as a foal at foot. He had been rescued with his mum Athena as they were both being illegally grazed on council land.

Apollo was very nervous of people, but thanks to the dedication and hard work of our grooms, has grown into a confident horse that loves attention. In fact, he will follow them around the field just to get a scratch under his chin!

He lives with a group of rambunctious boys and they have a great friendship, getting up to lots of harmless mischief. The HorseWorld team are hoping he will make a ridden horse in the future as he'll love exploring the world.
